




Insiyah, 15, heard that we'd be welcoming 20 young people into our new youth housing program. As this would be their first experience living on their own, and many would be without the necessities or funds to set up their new home; Insiyah applied for and received a \$1,500 grant to help. She used the funds to purchase dishes, cutlery, glasses and more for each suite. Upon seeing the donated items, one young tenant shared, "I have never had anyone give me new things". Insiyah wanted to do even more to help these young people so she asked for and received a donation of refurbished iPads from Rogers. Insiyah's gifts meant that these young people wouldn't have to purchase these items on their own, and her gifts showed them that someone cared about them. Insiyah's heart is filled with kindness and empathy and we are grateful to know her.

Sandi is a compassionate person who has helped fundraise for various throughout most of her life. When she first heard about Alisa's Wish Child & Youth Advocacy program, she immediately wanted to help, and raised over \$10,000 from her first event! Over the years, the now annual Strut Your Stuff fundraiser has turned into a much sought-after event and Sandi has raised a mind-blowing \$77,000, to help reduce the trauma of young victims of abuse and their families. Sandi sets an example for her peers and younger generations alike - showing them the importance of giving back and making a positive impact.
